
Porcelain vs. Ceramic Tile: Major Differences
According to the Tile Council of North America, industry group that
decides whether a tile is porcelain or ceramic, everything boils
down to whether the tile can meet a set of highly controlled water
absorption criteria.1 Both ceramic tile and porcelain tile usually
receive a surface glazing that makes them hard to distinguish from
one another.















## Cream Rona 14mm Nano polish Trans 100\*100


